Strengthening the rights of women through fair trade and solidarity

In 1996 the state of Rio Grande do Sul, was in a period of political and economic crisis with high rates of unemployment.



Isabel Cristina de Souza Cunha and her husband, Harold, were

two of the many people who lost their jobs. Without income, there was no guarantee of food on the table or the means to purchase necessities. As Isabel looked for opportunities, she heard about the fair- and solidarity-trade movement.

The Child Nursery linked to the Evangelical Church of the Lutheran Confession in Brazil where Isabel's children attend, proposed that the parents form a business cooperative to support those affected by the financial crisis.

Starting and growing the cooperative – today called Cooperbum – required hard work of Isabel and other members. To bolster their efforts and address larger challenges, including operating a women-led business, Cooperbum joined the Fair and Supportive Trade Network. The Network Project was launched by the Lutheran Foundation of Diakonia in 2012 with partnership and support from the **ELCA World Hunger.** The network brings together enterprises focusing in the area of food production, handicrafts, manufacturing and recycling.

Working with the Network has provided improvements in product quality, investments, and new consumers. Cooperbum's associates have seen improvement in income and the quality of life.

Vision 20/20 - Next Step to Success by Debra Geiger

We have an exciting update on Vision 20/20. December 31st will end our first full year of collection. When we started, our three year goal was to collect \$400,000.00. We can now say we are clearly on our way to meet this goal. The actual cash received to date is \$129,932.00 with the additional pledges of \$124,285.00, we have over a quarter of a million dollars towards our goal.

We just submitted another \$50,000.00 to the bank and the balance of our loan now stands at \$154,853.00 (down from our original \$2,250,000.00) and our monthly payments are down to \$1360.00 per month (down from \$10,700.00). We have come a long way. Thanks to all of you. With your continued support, we hope to pay our loan off within the next year (not in January of 2030 - the time frame of our loan). We already have over \$10,000.00 toward our next \$50,000.00 pay-down.

As we climb our mountain it gets steeper and our goal may be harder to reach but we have faith that our congregation will succeed with our quest. Our vision is not over when our mortgage is paid. The monies collected until the end of 2020 will be used to help replace our current air-conditioning/heating units. We had to replace 2 units this year but we had enough in our building and maintenance fund to cover these (note: this fund is now depleted). These units cost approximately \$15,000.00 each and we have 12 more to go. Please continue to contribute as you are able (no amount is too small), to help us meet our goal to have our church mortgage free and our ability to cover maintenance requirements.




Prayer Shawl Ministry

WINTER WALKING
