- ❖ Financial report: Giving to the General Fund is up \$17.8% for the month of May and 14.3% year-to-date. Expenses are up 56% in May due to several large bills coming due. The YTD expenses are only up by 3.2% due to the transfer of \$25,000 rental income from Designated Gifts Fund to the General Fund which reduced the YTD expenses by the same amount. Expense increases are primarily the result of personnel expenses which was expected. Vision2020 and HVAC contributions continue to grow.
- ❖ The replacement of the Family Life Center HVAC unit is complete. Thank you to all who contributed towards the \$29,685 cost.
- ❖ The first outdoor worship/dinner was held on June 12th with 45 people attending. Received good feedback.
- ❖ \$971.24 profit was raised from the food sales during the recent primary election. The amount will be divided between the HVAC and the Vision2020 funds.
- ❖ Social Ministry Committee reports that ULC will staff the food distributions at the Northern Lehigh Food Bank during the month of August. Volunteers are needed.
- ❖ Worship/Music Committee is updating the "job" descriptions of all of our worship volunteers. Website descriptions for our musical groups need to be updated.
- ❖ Kaiti Snyder has been approved by our Synod to begin her studies at the United Lutheran Seminary.
- ❖ Next Council meeting is Monday, July 15th at 7:00 PM. All are welcome.

From the Director of Music Ministries

July is one of my favorite months in the year. The weather is warm, perfect for shore or mountain vacations. Fresh fruits and vegetables abound. Life moves at a moderately slower pace. It is a time for rest and relaxation.

Summer is also a busy time of concerts for me with The Allentown Band, the oldest civilian concert band in the United States. The Band performs between 40 and 50 concerts per year and is particularly active during the first week of July with several concerts in celebration of Independence Day. Almost every concert during the year begins with *The Star-Spangled Banner*, which made me think about the history of our national anthem.

Almost everyone knows that lawyer and amateur poet Francis Scott Key wrote the poem, *Defence of Fort M'Henry*, after witnessing the British navy's bombardment of Fort McHenry in Baltimore Harbor during the War of 1812: "The rockets' red glare, the bombs bursting in air, gave proof through the night that our flag was still there". He was inspired by the large flag still flying above the fort denoting the United States victory.

The tune of the anthem was written by British composer, church organist, and musicologist John Stafford Smith (1750 – 1836) and was titled *To Anacreon in Heaven* for the Anacreontic Society, a social club in London for men of wealth and high social ranking. The club was named for the Greek poet Anacreon (ca. 582 – 485 BC), renowned for his drinking songs and odes to love. The members combined their love of music, eating, and drinking 12 times each year, beginning with a long concert featuring the best performers in London. The existence of the Society ended in 1792 after a 1791 visit from the Duchess of Devonshire. As reported by William Thomas Parke in a 2018 article about music in England from 1784 – 1830, because "some of the comic songs [were not] exactly calculated for the

entertainment of ladies, the singers were restrained; which displeasing many of the members, they resigned one after another; and a general meeting being called, the society was dissolved." The tune was popular in the United States, Key's words were set to it, and the song as renamed *The Star-Spangled Banner*.

It took some time for *The Star-Spangled Banner* to be approved as the official anthem of the United States. Before 1931, other national songs, such as *Hail, Columbia*, *America the Beautiful*, and *My Country, 'Tis of Thee* (which has the same tune as England's *God Save the Queen*) were frequently used at official occasions.

The Star-Spangled Banner was recognized for official use by the United States Navy in 1889 and by President Woodrow Wilson in 1916. The song was made the national anthem by congressional resolution in 1931 and signed by President Herbert Hoover.

I hope this history of our anthem gives us pause for thought. From interesting beginnings, *The Star-Spangled Banner* is now known throughout the world. May God continue to bless us with opportunity, freedom, and peace.

Ticks and Removal

The ticks are found in high grass, wooded areas and more. The best way to remove them is as follows: How to remove a tick. Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible. Pull upward with steady, even pressure. After removing the tick, thoroughly clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol or soap and water. Never crush a tick with your fingers. MALAWI

A Legacy of Stewardship

In the village of Chole, Shadrack has been cultivating trees for two years, and the oldest are about ready to sell and transplant. His nursery was made possible by a small business loan from the village savings and loan group established by Evangelical Lutheran Development Services (ELDS) supported by your gifts to **ELCA World Hunger**. In addition to small loans to farmers, ELDS trains farmers on crop diversification and increasing yields through new planting methods and the use of organic fertilizers. Common in many villages in Malawi trees have been cleared for firewood and farming leading to erosion and unclean air. After school, Shadrack planted the first seedlings in his nursery which has now grown to 1,200 trees. Caring for the land, coaxing life out of the soil and guiding it to maturity – this work connects Shadrack to the past, plants him firmly in the present and informs his vision for the future. And that vision, guided by his faith, is not only for his personal prosperity, but also for the prospering of his community.

The training he received he will pass on to others. Those who receive that training will use it to heal their own land and use the profits of increased yields to send their children to school.

2 New Ways to Give – Electronically

For your convenience, gifts and payments can be made to Union Lutheran Church in three new ways.

1. Using a Mobile Phone: Download the free Vanco GivePlus app. Use zip code 18078 to locate Union Lutheran Church. Choose which church funds to give to, put in the amounts, and it can be securely transferred from your bank account, debit card, or credit card. Set up a username and password to make recurring gifts.
2. Using a Computer: Use the “Give” link on our webpage ulclv.org. You will be securely connected to Vanco GivePlus, where you can choose the church funds, your gift amounts, and your bank account, debit card, or credit card. You also have the option to set up a username and password to make recurring gifts.

This is all possible because of an agreement that Vanco has with the ELCA. Our church has experience with Vanco, the transaction provider for Simply Giving, and have found their financial processing services to be highly secure and accurate.

As with all credit card or debit card charges, there is a transaction fee. This will be paid by Union Lutheran Church. Vanco GivePlus will give you an option to include the transaction fee with your gift. This increases your gift by 2.65% to donate the transaction fee. This is a completely voluntary option which you can choose before your donation is finalized and processed.



The Book Club will be taking a break for the summer, but you can get ready for our next discussion by reading *Where the Crawdads Sing* by Delia Owens.





“GOD’S NOT DEAD 2” DVD Review

Got time for a summer movie night? The library has plenty of family friendly DVDs, including this one rated PG.



I liked this DVD even better than the first God’s Not Dead movie (which was rated PG 13). The story revolves around a high school History teacher, Grace, who runs into legal problems after a student brings up Jesus and the Sermon on the Mount during a classroom lesson. The School Board decides that Grace has violated the separation of church and state, and the case goes to court.

The story moves back and forth between coverage of the legal case and personal vignettes of the characters’ lives. You will meet several from the first God’s Not Dead movie, including Chinese college student Martin, journalist Amy, Pastor David, and Ghanaian Reverend Jude.

The legal testimony is very educational, featuring real life authors and professors. J. Walter Wallace, who is a nationally known cold case detective, and Lee Strobel, author of *The Case for Christ*, made me interested to learn more about the proof of a historical Jesus.

In 1971 he graduated from Parkland High School.

They say their fervent hope is that the congregation will exceed the goal of paying off the mortgage and provide funding for other programs and projects that are truly needed.

Dave is one of the tallest men at ULC and everyone looks up to him (even those taller than he) as a faithful witness and servant of our Lord. The next time you see Dave and Debbie, thank them for being such devoted members of our congregation. It’s people like them who keep ULC alive and well.

The Klotz Scholarship


All post-high school students!!!
