donated eight handmade baby blankets and one prayer shawl to the Cay Gallagon Life House.



Robin is a sensitive, introverted boy who spends hours painting elaborate pictures of endangered animals. He's also prone to erratic behavior and about to be expelled from third grade for smashing his friend in the face. As his son grows more troubled, Theo hopes to keep him off psychoactive drugs. He learns of an experimental neurofeedback treatment to bolster Robin's emotional control, one that involves training the boy on the recorded patterns of his mother's brain.

### How many of you enjoy putting together puzzles?

Every year our Finance Team is tasked with putting together the "puzzle" of next year's budget.

There are many pieces to this puzzle:

- -During the summer, we begin to work with all of our committees sharing their YTD expenditures and asking them to determine their needs for the next year;
- -Property Committee analyzes the costs of maintaining & operating our beautiful facility;
- -Staff Support and Finance Committees work together to determine potential staff cost of living adjustments;
- -Finance Committee analyzes our year to date income & compares to giving trends from previous years.

Next comes the fun part, we get to put all of the pieces together – hoping and praying that the costs to keep our church facility & programming balance with our anticipated income.



### So what do you do when the pieces don't fit together?

Let's take a look at our proposed 2023 budget.

At our December bi-annual meeting, Church Council presented the budget for 2023 with an increase of **only 1.5%** over 2022 – that sounds like a reasonable increase, right?

At our December bi-annual meeting, Church Council presented the budget for 2023 with an increase of **only 1.5%** over 2022 – that sounds like a reasonable increase, right?

However, as of end of November our income is \$29,573.95 or (9.3%) lower than 2021, so to build a budget using the anticipated 2022 income would not be wise.

So given this data, the Finance Committee looked at the anticipated 2023 expenses. Is there anywhere that we can cut expenses? As you all know, electricity rates are increasing, contracts for snow plowing are on the rise, plus much more. We determined that the projected expenses were reasonable and could not be lowered.

So, if we can't cut expenses and we can't justify increasing our expected income we are left with this simple math problem ....

projected income of \$335,000
projected expenses of - 381,000
That leaves us with a projected deficit of \$46,000

What is our game plan? The church does have cash reserves to help to bridge this gap temporarily. Do not worry, the "for sale sign" is not going to be swinging from the steeple anytime soon. BUT, we do need everyone's help.
