A message from Finance Committee

The last three years our congregation has lived through unusually trying times. We have been blessed to have survived a pandemic and the social and economic challenges that come with it. During these times we have continued to serve our membership and our community.

We found new ways to conduct Sunday worship services. We managed to keep our spiritual and social ministry going despite masks and distancing. We were able to find ways to serve the community around us by continuing to support the Northern, Lehigh and Parkland Cares Food Banks as well as running our own little pantry here at Union Lutheran. We found ways to continue offering fellowship and support to our membership despite the lack of personal contact that the pandemic placed on us.

This last year, 2022 was a strong year for us as we were finally able to bring a more normal Sunday worship and return to gathering in person. We have seen some growth in our membership and have added a new electronic sign to our campus making us more visible to the community. All of this came with an economic cost as we have faced a growing deficit in our budget. We have been able to maintain a strong cash flow thanks to our cash reserves and some timely contributions by members and in memory of former members.

We are concerned over the growing deficit in our budget. We are also concerned in our need for volunteers to help us bring things back to normal and grow our congregation and our service to the community.

We ask you to accept the Lord's challenge to gather your family together and discuss and pray for ways you can help volunteer to help in the Sunday service, volunteer to serve on a committee, or volunteer to help at social functions. When you volunteer, you are the heart of the congregation and when you donate to the church you are the life blood of this church. There is no price on forgiveness and we cannot earn our way into God's house, but if we are his faithful servants, we should want to do all we can to strengthen his church.

We know we cannot erase our deficit in one year or two but if we can change the expanding deficit to a shrinking one, we will be able to grow.

As a faithful servant of God, I ask you to show your faith by wanting to do all that you can.

ELCA World Hunger

Indonesia

For Bualazanolo, a rice farmer and father of five, a lack of opportunity in his Indonesian village made it very difficult to earn enough money to care for himself and his family. That is, until he connected with a local community development center that partners with **ELCA World Hunger.**

"I learned about rice farming from my parents," Bualazanolo says. "Even though I have worked hard, the harvest is not sufficient for my family's food needs for the whole year. Sometimes I have to borrow other people's rice and pay for it at the next harvest."

Initially, Bualazanolo was hesitant to introduce new techniques into his farming, but after connecting with the development center, he and other community members facing the same challenges received agricultural training and learned how to produce compost, maintain healthy soil, make use of natural pesticides, and more.

Gifts to ELCA World Hunger support this project and others like it helping people such as Bualazanolo get the training and tools they need to improve their livelihoods.

"At first, I was skeptical about the benefits of this training," says Bualazanolo, "but the center's staff continued to encourage and motivate me to start." With the training staff accompanying him, he put his new skills into practice. Now his rice yield not only feeds his family year-round, but leaves enough extra that he can sell to cover his children's school costs.

"Now my wife and I are happy because my rice production has increased," he says. "This is a sign that my rice farming skills have improved and gives us new hope and a better life. My wife and children and I can smile about our future."



Our next selection is **Don't Cry for Me** by
Daniel Black.

As Jacob lies dying, he begins to write a letter to his only son, Isaac. They have not met or spoken in many years, and there are things that Isaac must

know. Stories about his ancestral legacy in rural Arkansas that extend back to slavery. Secrets from Jacob's tumultuous relationship with Isaac's mother and the shame he carries from the dissolution of their family. Tragedies that informed Jacob's role as a father and his reaction to Isaac's being gay.

But most of all, Jacob must share with Isaac the unspoken truths that reside in his heart. He must give voice to the trauma that Isaac has inherited. And he must create a space for the two to find peace.

With piercing insight and profound empathy, acclaimed author Daniel Black illuminates the lived experiences of Black fathers and queer sons, offering an authentic and ultimately hopeful portrait of reckoning and reconciliation. Spare as it is sweeping, poetic as it is compulsively readable, *Don't Cry for Me* is a monumental novel about one family grappling with love's hard edges and the unexpected places where hope and healing take flight.


