Robins everywhere—Daffodil sightings—and the crocus' survived another winter! Easter is around the corner. As we finish our Lenten journey, we look toward Holy Week. For us, it is the holiest week of the year.

It starts with Palm Sunday with us waving palm branches and remembering how Jesus entered Jerusalem on a donkey. How many of you remember waving palm branches on Palm Sunday growing up? I do, and I'm sure the children of this congregation will remember that long after they have grown up.

After Palm Sunday, we gather for worship again on Maundy Thursday. "Maundy" comes from a Latin word, which means Mandate or Command. Jesus says, "I give you a new commandment that you love one another." It's Love Thursday! Jesus also washed the disciples' feet that night—the job of a servant. It's Serve Thursday! And he gave us Holy Communion. The Last Supper becomes the Lord's Supper.

Good Friday is as important as Easter. You cannot have resurrection without death. Good Friday at Faith is a quiet, even mystical event where, in the dim light, we hear scripture, sing songs, and light candles. We remember Jesus' death on the cross—a death that brought LIFE! Good Friday is only good because it is followed by Easter.

Easter is the day we shout "Life!" in the face of "Death!" In this crazy world, death appears to have won. There is suffering and pain everywhere we look. Our hearts break for victims of illness, accident, disasters, and war. We suffer with friends whose marriages have broken, whose children are hurting, who have lost jobs, or who live with the burden of anxiety and depression. Through his death and resurrection, Jesus has entered their world of suffering. Jesus has entered our world, and he brings life in the face of death—light in the midst of darkness. Somedays this is hard to believe. On other days, this is all we can believe. This Holy Week, enter into this sacred space and hold on to the promise of God: Jesus is here! Thanks be to God!




Please consider joining us as we continue our study -- "Who Is Jesus? What a Difference a Lens Makes," by Judy Yates Siker.

Our next selection is October in the Earth by Olivia Hawker. In Depression-era Kentucky, a defiant wife embarks on an impulsive and liberating journey. Del Wensley, wife of the most celebrated preacher in Harlan County, tries to mind her place. Until her husband's infidelity pushes an already strained marriage to a breaking point. Clinging to her last hope for self-respect, Del



turns her back on the rigid life she's known. A coal train is rolling through the valley. With her eyes wide open to the unfamiliar, and to the freedom she craves, Del takes to the rails. Rumbling across America, Del is soon drawn into a transient community among outcasts—and finds a special friend in Louisa Trout. A nomadic single mother, Louisa teaches Del the ways of the boxcars and promises to help her reach a migrant enclave where Del can learn the skills she'll need to survive. But as they move forward together under desperate circumstances, even the closest of bonds threatens to break. With the Depression taking its toll, Del must gather her strength and faith. As she carries on toward one unknown after another, her life becomes a fulfilling, sometimes dangerous, and exhilarating adventure. But no matter the risks, it's a life that she alone controls.

#### ELCA WORLD HUNGER—Burundi

**ELCA World Hunger** partners with the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) in rural, isolated eastern Burundi, near the Tanzanian border. The region was hard hit by the violence of civil war between Hutus and Tutsis in the 1990s and again by political unrest in 2015. Because of this history, migrants and displaced people headed for the border region in hope of entering Tanzania.


Now, as refugees return home to Burundi, they experience poverty due to the lack of employment opportunities and limited access to land ownership. LWF accompanies neighbors facing these challenges in the region and has collaborated with community members to implement a holistic set of programs that empower adults and youth to create opportunities for themselves and their families.

Meet Bernard, who leads a local palm oil production cooperative in Burundi. Initially Bernard and his co-producers were using strenuous and inefficient methods to extract oil from the palm fruits, which limited their profits. However, after hearing about LWF's work in the region, Bernard led an effort to request funding for new machinery that would increase the cooperative's production enough to provide members with a sufficient, more stable income.

Thanks in part to gifts to ELCA World Hunger, LWF was able to meet Bernard's request. The new machinery had a significant impact on the community: neighbors and people from nearby villages brought their fruits to Bernard's cooperative to have the oil extracted for a fee, which created an additional income stream for the cooperative.

As president of the cooperative, Bernard was responsible for organizing meetings and managing the group's finances. He was able to hire four workers to help harvest his crops, and the oil-extraction project had a significant impact on his life. With the increased profits from it, Bernard built a nice house near the market for his family and was able to pay for their medical expenses. The project's success is a testament to LWF's commitment to supporting communities in need, in collaboration with partners such as **ELCA World Hunger**. Bernard's leadership and hard work were crucial in making the project's success a reality.
